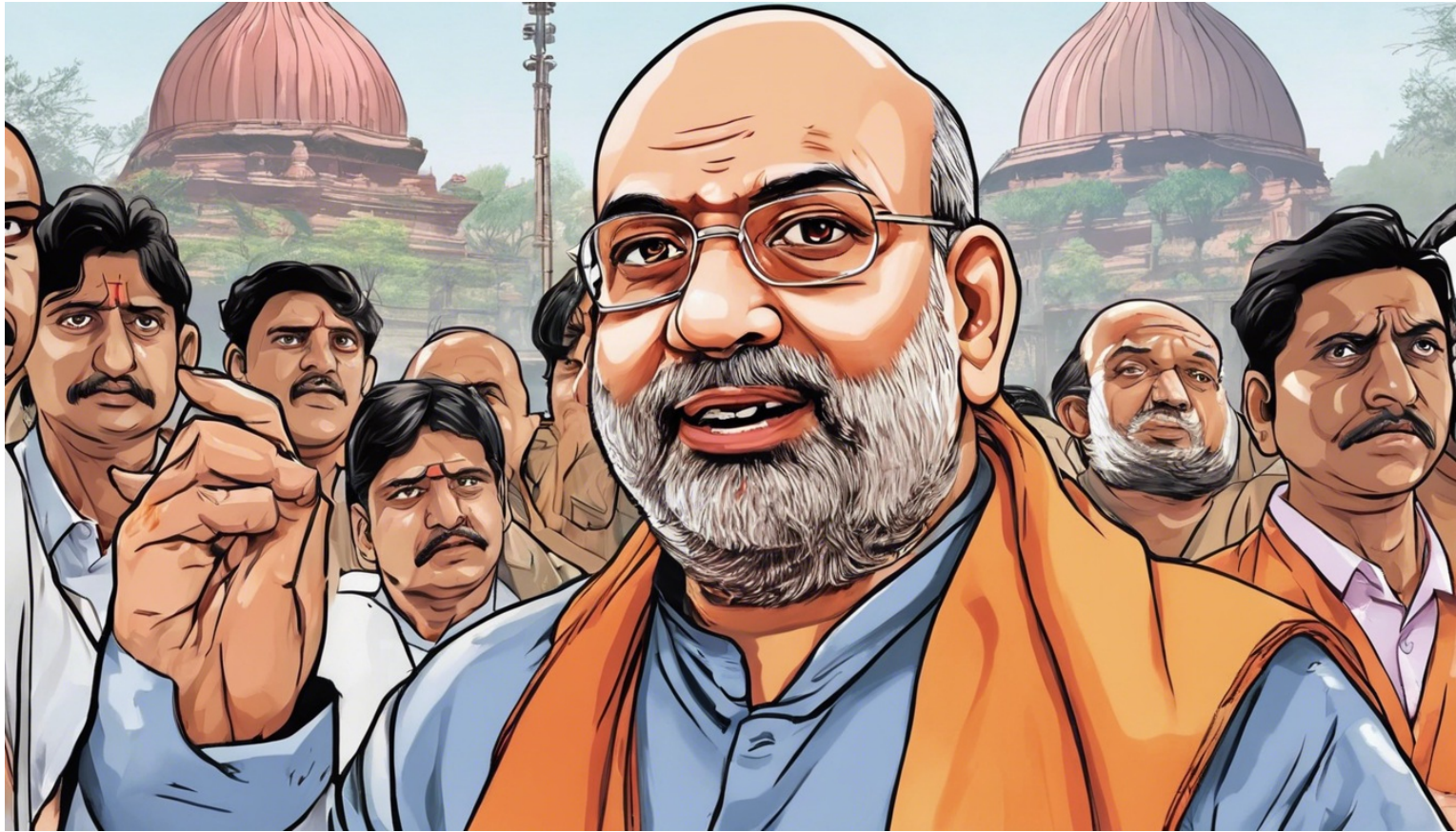


Breaking Down the Amit Shah Video Controversy: Delhi, Assam, Maharashtra Police Action



A doctored video allegedly showing Union Home Minister Amit Shah's remarks on reservations in Telangana has sparked a controversy, leading to legal actions and arrests by police in Delhi, Assam, and Maharashtra, the latest news in the delhi ncr [\[1\]](#). Legal Actions Taken

1. Telangana Chief Minister Revanth Reddy and four other Congress office-bearers in the state have been issued notices by the Delhi Police to appear before them on Wednesday [\[1\]](#).
2. The Delhi Police has also written to social media platforms like Facebook and Twitter to trace the user who first posted the doctored video [\[1\]](#).
3. The FIRs have been registered under various sections of the Indian Penal Code and the Information Technology Act [\[1\]](#).

Political Reactions

1. Prime Minister Narendra Modi has requested the Election Commission to take action against those responsible for the doctored video [\[1\]](#).
2. The Delhi Police has summoned Telangana Chief Minister Revanth Reddy for questioning on May 1 regarding the doctored video [\[2\]](#).
3. The Congress has warned of similar actions against BJP leaders in Congress-ruled states, while the BJP has filed a complaint with the Election Commission, alleging that the Congress circulated the "deep fake and morphed" video of Shah to disrupt the election process [\[2\]](#).

Arrests and Further Actions

Location	Action
Assam	One person named Reetom Singh, associated with the Assam Congress as the party's 'War Room Coordinator', has been arrested in connection with the fake video [2] .
Delhi	The Delhi Police has filed an FIR under various sections of the IPC and the IT Act, and arrests are likely to follow across the country [2] .
Rajasthan	The Rajasthan BJP's social media department also filed a fresh FIR in connection with the incident [3] .
Delhi	The Delhi Police Special Cell visited the Gandhi Bhavan (Telangana Congress headquarters) and served notices to 4 persons, including the Hyderabad city Congress spokesperson and social media staff, for posting an allegedly fake video of Union Minister Amit Shah [3] . The notices were issued under Section 91/160 CrPC, seeking information and production of documents/electronic devices related to the case registered by the Special Cell regarding the posting of morphed videos of Amit Shah on social media [3] .

The BJP has urged the Election Commission to direct social media platforms to enhance their monitoring mechanisms to detect and remove deep fake content

related to the electoral process [\[2\]](#).

Legal Actions and Arrests

Complaints and FIRs Filed

A complaint was filed by a BJP functionary Pratik Karpe against the social media handles of Maharashtra Youth Congress and 16 others for sharing a deepfake video of Union Home Minister Amit Shah [\[4\]](#). In the deepfake video, Amit Shah was seen announcing the curtailment of reservation rights of SCs, STs and OBCs, which was completely different from his original speech [\[4\]](#). The complainant alleged that the accused persons made the deepfake video and circulated it widely on social media platforms with the intention of causing disruption, enmity and hatred among different castes [\[4\]](#). The police have been asked to take down the deepfake video immediately and register a case against the accused persons [\[4\]](#).

The FIRs have been registered under various sections of the Indian Penal Code and the Information Technology Act [\[1\]](#).

Arrests Made

1. A 31-year-old man associated with the Assam Congress was arrested in Guwahati for allegedly sharing a 'fake video' of Amit Shah [\[5\]](#).
2. Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma confirmed the arrest of an individual named Reetam Singh, a lawyer and the State War Room Coordinator of the Congress's Assam unit, for his involvement in the fake video [\[1\]](#).

Notices Issued

Telangana Chief Minister Revanth Reddy and four other Congress office-bearers in the state have been issued notices by the Delhi Police to appear before them in connection with the investigation [\[1\]](#).

Political Reactions and Accusations

Prime Minister's Accusations

Prime Minister Narendra Modi targeted the opposition, particularly the Congress, for circulating the tampered video, accusing them of spreading fake news out of fear of losing the elections ("Haar ka Darr") [\[6\]](#). He warned people to be cautious of such fake videos and images being spread on social media, often using AI to mimic voices, and asked them to inform the police or the party if they receive such content [\[6\]](#).

BJP's Complaints and Allegations

1. The BJP filed a complaint with the chief electoral officer of Andhra Pradesh, accusing a social media handle of the Congress of posting the tampered speech of Amit Shah [\[6\]](#).
2. PM Modi accused the Congress of indulging in vote bank politics, alleging that the Congress's "Shehzaada" (likely referring to Rahul Gandhi) had promised to conduct an "X-ray" of the country and distribute people's wealth among their vote bank [\[6\]](#).
3. The BJP filed three complaints with the Election Commission, accusing Congress of circulating a 'deep fake and morphed' video of Amit Shah to disrupt the electoral process [\[5\]](#).

Disrupting Electoral Process

1. PM Modi accused the opposition of creating fake videos of him, Home Minister Amit Shah, and other BJP leaders to disrupt the peaceful electoral process [\[5\]](#).
2. The opposition's alleged actions of creating and circulating fake videos are seen as an attempt to disrupt the peaceful electoral process [\[5\]](#).

Criticism of Opposition's Tactics

1. PM Modi criticized the Congress leaders for using technology to create fake videos and spread misinformation [\[1\]](#).
2. PM Modi urged the crowd not to commit the crime of sharing videos that appear doctored and requested people to alert the authorities if they receive such videos on WhatsApp [\[5\]](#).

Government's Efforts Highlighted

PM Modi highlighted the government's efforts in providing better healthcare services through the Ayushman Bharat Yojana, including extending free treatment to all elderly people above the age of 70 [\[6\]](#).
